CHPE Project Update: Construction Progress and Community Benefits

The Champlain Hudson Power Express (CHPE) project is actively underway in Stony Point, bringing both short-term construction activity and long-term financial benefits to our community.

What is CHPE?

The Champlain Hudson Power Express (CHPE) is a major, cleanenergy initiative using High-Voltage Direct Current (HVDC) cables to bring hydropower and wind power from Quebec into New York City. The project spans about 339 miles and can deliver up to 1,250 MW–enough to power more than a million households, while helping reduce greenhouse gas emissions and stabilize the grid. (www.chpexpress.com).

The pipeline originates in Quebec, runs beneath Lake Champlain and then under the Hudson River, surfacing in Stony Point. The pipeline reenters the Hudson in Clarkstown, near Rockland Lake. While the Town of Stony Point continues to monitor the project and advocate on behalf of our residents, it's important to note that all permits and approvals for the CHPE project were issued at the state level. The Town does not have decision-making authority over the project's routing or construction.

Why the detour out of the River at Stony Point?

The original plan was for the CHPE cable to run straight down the Hudson River. However, environmental advocates raised strong concerns about disturbing a spawning ground for the Atlantic sturgeon located in this area of the River. Negotiations between groups like Riverkeeper and Scenic Hudson began around 2010, with CHPE developer TDI agreeing to the alternate route in 2012.

Construction Progress

In the Park Road area, the discovery of an unmarked aquifer has required a redesign of the project. Instead of a horizontal directional drill (HDD), this segment will now use a trench design. This change will result in intermittent detours and traffic pattern shifts



along Park Road. Access to homes and driveways will be maintained, and we ask all residents and visitors to please obey posted signage. The CHPE team is also coordinating closely with the **Stony Point Battlefield staff** to minimize any disruptions during the busy summer season. Construction is expected to begin this summer and take approximately six weeks to complete.

On June 16th, work began on the installation of the cable beneath the Farley Bridge, requiring a full lane closure of the northbound lane on 9W. During this time, Lowland Hill Road will temporarily become a detour route for cars traveling northbound on Route 9W. The southbound lane on 9W will remain open. This work will continue throughout the summer.

Additionally, Orange & Rockland and CHPE have begun gas-line replacement and service upgrades along the route. These upgrades will affect both business and residential customers, with advanced notice provided to impacted properties. This phase began in Stony Point on June 24th and includes gas main upgrades along the route.

When will the project be completed? The CHPE project is expected to be completed in the Rockland County area by late 2025, with gas main replacement work extending into 2026. A full curb-to-curb paving of Route 9W, from Stony Point to Clarkstown, is anticipated to be

completed by the end of 2026.

What's in it for Stony Point?

In return for having to endure the pain of construction, the Town of Stony Point has negotiated substantial financial benefits. The Town has been awarded \$5.3 million in funds, with \$2.6 million already received. The remaining amount will be paid upon completion of the project. These funds are restricted for capital projects only.

So far, the Town has used approximately \$420,000 from this fund, with an additional \$1.4 million earmarked for upcoming projects. The \$420,000 has been used towards upgrades and improvements at our Parks and Recreational facilities which can be enjoyed by our residents.

Planned future uses include critical infrastructure improvements like the headworks project at the Wastewater Treatment Plant and the Beach Road pump station upgrade, both mandated by the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC).

In addition to the funds to be utilized for capital improvement projects, the Town has also received \$2.9 million for streetscaping along the 9W corridor. Finally, the Town has negotiated PILOT payments that will generate revenue for Stony Point over the next 30 years, providing long-term financial benefits to the community.
